And the leadership comes from many different places in the Agency. From our clients as they take that first step towards a new job, or a student in the Music School decides to try a new instrument. From our staff when they decide to take a new approach with a special participant who needs extra support. From a shelter resident who agrees to find housing with the support of our staff. From our volunteers who willingly offer their precious time to help someone in need.

Leadership is demonstrated in the small act of saying "let me help you with that" whether it be to advocate for someone who has not received their full entitlement, or to speak to someone who has been disrespectful to another individual or group. As you look through the pages of this annual report you will see statistics that speak to our reach into the community, but more than that, they tell the story of the people we serve. We are proud of our community and the work we do with our partners to support all those who are in need.

This year our Board demonstrated strong leadership in taking the decision to voluntarily integrate with Mid-Toronto Community Services. With an impressive 132 years of combined experience providing excellent and responsive services to our downtown communities as well as a strong alignment between our missions, visions, and values, it was evident that joining the two organizations together made perfect sense. So the Boards of both organizations agreed to voluntarily integrate effective January 1, 2014. Since that time we have joined under the Dixon Hall umbrella. Representing nearly 43,000 bed nights, the occupancy rate of our two shelters — Heyworth House and Schoolhouse — surpassed 98%.

We served more than 132,000 meals to shelter residents plus 10-15 meals a day to others in need.

More than 17,000 men and women sought out the services of Out of the Cold during the 2013 season.

Over 400 youth and 100 families from the Regent Park, Moss Park, Rivertown, Esplanade and St. James Town communities were supported by our Children & Youth Department.

We engaged a total of 190 young people in our MVP (Mentoring for Violence Prevention) Program, which uses sport (ice hockey, soccer, cricket, basketball) as a platform to provide mentorship to young people and to address issues around youth violence.

80 youth participated in the Summer Camp.

2013 marked the conclusion of our youth gang prevention program titled the MY Regent Park Project. This 3.5 year federally funded project engaged over 200 at-risk youth from the Regent Park community, and their families.

150 immigrants and newcomers to Canada were supported by our Settlement Services.

We saw over 1500 Visits to our Employment Centre. Over 65% of those served by the Centre have found employment. Over 15% of those served by the Centre have been connected with training programs.

Over 300 **children** per week benefitted from subsidized music lessons in 21 different private and group classes offered by the **Dixon Hall Music School**.

In partnership with ACT, 2, 122 hot meals were delivered by Meet and Eat and Good Company Lunch Program to 103 people living with HIV/AIDS.

Case Management provided 3,565 supportive counseling hours to 246 people helping with emotional and practical support navigating the health care system, accessing programs and provided services, supportive counselling, crisis management and more.

Providing 9,152 activity hours to 89 Seniors, the Adult Enrichment and Wellness Program offers members a warm and welcoming place to connect and make new friends while taking part in activities such as fitness, jewelry making, calligraphy and outings.

We provided 1 (, \OG rides to 441 people taking them to essential medical, and therapy appointments. Our **Community** Transportation Program also takes people to social outings, shopping and community programs. Our specially trained drivers and door-to-door service are appreciated by all who use this service.

23,000 activity hours were provided to 127 people living with Alzheimer disease or a related dementia and for people who are disabled or dealing with a physical illness. The **Social Circle — Adult & Alzheimer Day Programs** offer a place where people can make friends

64,881 meals were delivered to 522 seniors and people living with HIV/AIDS through Meals on Wheels & Food for Life. Just as vital as the hot, nutritious meal is the daily connection with our friendly volunteers. Delivered seven days per week these essential programs really make a difference in their lives.

An amazing 1,374 volunteers donated 21,625 hours in 2013. Without our dedicated volunteers, we would not be able to provide the care we do in our community.

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
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
